A FEW WORDS FROM YOUR SOCIETY PRESIDENT

The AGS Executive Board continues
preparations to file an application for
recognition of a non-profit tax exemption
with the IRS. One of the tasks is to revise
our Bylaws. Another task is for the AGS
Board to initiate an annual budget process.
During our October meeting the
membership, by unanimous acclamation,
approved the proposed AGS calendar year
2016 budget.

Also at the October meeting, Library
Liaison Linda Seitz, announced library
patron access to the Fold3 genealogical
database. Fold3 (Library Edition) allows
access to the same database of materials that
individual Fold3 Premium members enjoy
currently on their own paid accounts. Now

this access can come through your local library. Distributed by ProQuest, Fold3 Library Edition by Ancestry provides access to US military records, including the stories, photos, and personal documents of the men and women who served. This continually-growing collection contains millions of records from world-class archives, many of which are exclusively available on Fold3. With content from the Revolutionary War onward, Fold3 Library Edition is an invaluable research resource for historians, genealogists, researchers, military enthusiasts, veterans and their families, teachers, and battle re-enactors. Find Fold3 on library computers or try Fold3 Library Edition from a computer at home; Arlington, Grand Prairie, Kennedale and Mansfield patrons use this link <http://morelibrary.org/resource/fold3> Fold3 was designed to allow people to interact with what they find and add their own information and insights. To add something to Fold3 you'll need a Fold3 free member account. That insures other site visitors will know where the information came from. Members can come back later and update, remove or manage the things they've added. If you already have a current account at Fold3 there is no need to create a new one, just log in with your existing Fold3 account password.

Revamped APL websites are making their debut in stages during the latter half of October. The APL has two library websites, the main APL website and running concurrently, MORE, a consortium website. MORE (Metroplex Online Resources) showcases the electronic resources and databases offered by four library systems in the North Texas area. Resources are provided by the cities of Arlington, Grand Prairie, Mansfield, and Kennedale. Your Society's main focus is the genealogy reference collection, so do take a few minutes to browse the website genealogy pages found at both new websites and try some of the research tools. If you encounter problems, report your experience using the website feedback feature or contact someone on the AGS Board.

170,000 GREAT DEPRESSION IMAGES ARE NOW ONLINE

In the 1930s, the U.S. government sent photographers to all the states to capture America "at her most vulnerable." President

Franklin D. Roosevelt's team wanted a record of what was going on and images of real lives and struggles to help rally support for his New Deal policies. Over 170,000 images were taken.

Yale University and the Library of Congress have just made the entire collection available online on a site called

Photogrammar at

<http://photogrammar.yale.edu>.

I found the interactive map at Photogrammar to be very useful. The map plots the approximately 90,000 photographs that have geographical information. (Not all of the 170,000 photos taken included geographical information so only those with the information could be indexed.) The interactive map allows the user to customize the search by photographer, date, and place.

TEXAS HONOR DAY

Nov. 3, 1793 was Stephen F. Austin's birthday. Known as the Father of Texas, Stephen F. Austin carried on his father, Moses' work to establish the first Texas Anglo-American Colony "The Old 300," by bringing 300 families to a part of Mexico in what is now known as Texas. Austin was imprisoned in a Mexican jail for defending the colonists' rights. He was a man of patience and diplomacy, a "thinker," who made things happen. Each year a celebration is held at the site of his death in Brazoria County.

Nov. 6, 1891 is The DRT Founders Day. On this date, a group of ladies met in Houston in the home of Mrs. Andrew Brisco to carry out the idea of Misses Betty Ballinger and Hally Bryan for organizing a Republic of Texas daughters' organization to meet with the Texas Veterans.

DNA STUDY HELPS SOLVE LINCOLN LINEAGE DEBATE

Nathaniel Shuda, Oshkosh Northwestern Media 11:28 a.m. CST November 2, 2015 wrote: Vicky Reany Paulson has known all her life that she is related to Abraham Lincoln. She has written two books about the Hanks family and its connection to Lincoln, says she is thrilled after a new study has solved a 150-year-old mystery surrounding the true identity of Nancy Hanks Lincoln's mother.

Family Tree DNA, a division of Houston-based genetics company Gene by Gene Ltd., started the Hanks DNA Project in 2002 to help identify modern-day descendants of the Hanks family through DNA testing. On Oct. 21, the company released the results of its latest DNA test, revealing definitive scientific evidence that identifies Nancy Hanks Lincoln's mother, said Suzanne Hallstrom, the project's administrator.

The mystery had finally been solved: Nancy Hanks Lincoln was one of two illegitimate children of Lucy Hanks Sparrow.

Friday Sept. 13, 1929 WATSON NEWS

Mr. and Mrs. Jno. Behrens and children visited **Buck Day** who is dangerously ill at Dallas. The physicians say that there is no possible chance for him, tho we hope he will soon gain a new hold on life and be back with us again.

Friday September 13, 1929 Wins In Race Cross Country (*picture of pilot*)

He flew from Los Angeles to Cleveland in 13 hours 15 minutes and 7 seconds to win the non-stop race between those two cities held in connection with the National Air Races. Lieutenant Henry Brown, Cleveland (O.) airmail pilot, was awarded a prize of \$5,000 for his victory.

Funeral service for Mrs. W. T. Jordon (*Mrs. W. T. Jordan?*) was held at Wood's Chapel last Friday week, August 30, by Bro. Waldon, assisted by Bro. A. S. Henry. Mrs. Jordon has been very sick for several months. She was Miss Lassie Rowell, born in Jackson, Mississippi, in 1853. She was married there to Mr. G. J. Poe, February 18, 1870, and to them were born nine children, five of whom died in infancy. Four of them are living, as follows: Bascomb Poe, of Alexander, Leslie Poe, of Ft. Worth, Fred Poe, and Miss Lallie Poe, of

this community. Mr. and Mrs. Poe came to Texas in 1874 and lived in Gidines, Texas, until Mr. Poe's death, in 1888. Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Jordon were married November 24, 1891. To them were born one son, Mr. C. G. Jordon, of Arlington, her two step-children are Mr. Harve Jordon and Mrs. Max King, both of this community. Mr. and Mrs. Jordon have lived in our community 26 years. Her devoted Christian life has been a blessing to our entire community and her going away was peaceful. It was our loss and Heaven's gain, when she was called away. She was christened into the Methodist church at the age of 8 days, and was of good influence to all who came in her presence. It was easier to give her up as she was prepared to go. Among her last wishes were that her children would live Christ-like as she had taught them. She also leaves 13 grand-children and 2 great-grand-children. This community joins the family in their sorrow.

Mr. Moore is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Walter Shelton and Mrs. J. M. Grogan, of Arlington, and Mrs. Dave Roberts of Handley; eight sons, Walter, Will, Minor, Frank, Alden, Athol, Roy and Ray, all of Arlington; two sisters, Mrs. Laura Hall, of McKinney and Mrs. Mollie Schooler, of Ft. Worth; thirty-nine grandchildren and fifteen great-grandchildren.

In the death of **W. H. L. (Uncle Billy) Moore**, this community feels keenly the loss of a citizen, a neighbor, a Christian gentleman, and withal a good man.

Uncle Billy was one of those peculiar types of men who held deep convictions about anything he considered worthwhile. Early in life he learned what it meant to be classed with the underprivileged. His lot was cast with the toiling masses who work from sun to sun. Somehow his hardships and difficulties, seemingly insurmountable at times, became his stepping stones to better circumstances. It was in these early years that he developed an intensely human nature. He desired to make a contribution to the sphere of civilization wherein he lived. This wish was consummated in his entering the ministry and devoting a life of service to the people that he was wont to call his neighbors.

He held a great hope for better days, and when on last Saturday evening he stacked his arms like a good soldier and began the march to the home camp ground he answered the Great Commander's summons with: "I am ready."

\$30,000,000 Bridge to Span Famous Golden Gate *(picture of proposed bridge and designer)*

This proposed \$30,000,000 bridge with a 4000-foot single span, the largest in the world, will cross San Francisco bay's famous golden Gate in a few years. Joseph B. Strauss (inset), of Chicago, is the designer. Before permission was obtained for the building of the bridge, assurance was given the government that it could be demolished quickly in time of war to prevent bottling up of American ships. It will total 6176 feet in length. Construction work is expected to start soon.

Friday Sept. 13, 1929 HELPING TO BUILD TEXAS

The new army airport at San Antonio, designed to be the aviation West Point, will represent an initial investment of about \$14,000,000 and a probable ultimate outlay of around \$50,000,000. It includes 800 buildings for housing 2,200 officers and men and their families. When completed, 250 planes can land or take off simultaneously and more than 300 planes will be used for training the cadets of the flying school to be established there.

Friday Sept. 20, 1929 Found Wreckage of Plane. *(picture of pilot)*

Wreckage of the Transcontinental Air Transport passenger plane in which six passengers and two pilots lost their lives was found on the side of a mountain 100 miles west of Albuquerque, N. M., by Pilot George Rice, above, of the Western Air Express. Rice sighted the missing plane while on a regular plane run.
