Fort Worth Stockyards claim to having the first indoor rodeo is challenged!

For nearly a century, Fort Worth has claimed that the first indoor rodeo took place March 11-16, 1918, in the Stockyards' North Side Coliseum, now known as Cowtown Coliseum.

But this month, the Wichita Eagle published a report arguing that an indoor rodeo took place in Kansas in January 1918, about seven weeks before the one in Fort Worth.

To those who aren't rodeo fans, this may seem like a silly claim to get worked up about. But lots of people, especially Fort Worth boosters and Western history buffs, see the issue as more than bragging rights over a historical footnote. The launch of indoor rodeos was an important milestone in the evolution of the sport and presaged a 1922 rodeo at New York's Madison Square Garden that drew national attention. But unlike the contest held in Fort Worth two months later, the Wichita competition wasn't called a rodeo, and Cowtown loyalists say that's crucial. Essentially, a rodeo by any other name doesn't sound too historically significant.
