Major Ripley Arnold to be Honored

Jim Lane, Fort Worth attorney and long-time member of NFWHS, has been concerned that people are forgetting about Major Ripley Arnold, the man that established Fort Worth and named it after his commander, General William Jenkins Worth.

It appears Mr. Lane can put his mind at ease because plans are being made to put a statue of Major Ripley Arnold in a park near the Trinity riverbank.

The Tarrant Regional Water District board, of which Lane is a member, approved accepting a donation last week for the statue in the new John V. McMillan Park along the riverfront near Tarrant County College Trinity River Campus.

The statue, which will be 12 feet, 6 inches tall, will show Arnold gazing toward the confluence of the West and Clear forks of the Trinity near where a small lake is planned as part of the Trinity River Vision

The statue will be crafted by artist, Archie St. Clair. Many people in the NFWHS will recall Mr. St. Clair because he set up shop in the room across the hall from the museum while he was sculpting a horse and rider that was to be sent to Australia. People were amazed and would come by to see the progress of the big horse in the little room. The horse was so big that it had to be cut into pieces to get it out of the room to ship it to Australia.

The plan is to dedicate the statue on Fort Worth's 164th birthday June 6.
