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A Bulls Tale

By now everyone probably knows who Bill Pickett is, but did you know that the bronze sculpture of Bill Pickett in front of the Cowtown Coliseum was put there by the NFWHS? Yes, it sure was!

The Society commissioned artist Lisa Perry to create The Bulldogger statue of Pickett, which was completed in 1987. The NFWHS presented it to the City of Fort Worth, and it is now part of Fort Worth's Public Art collection.

Recently, someone broke the tail off Bill Pickett's bull! We speculate that an over zealous rodeo fan decided to climb the statue and take a ride, breaking off the tail.

Hub Baker, Coliseum manager, retrieved the tail, which weighs about 40 pounds, and passed it along to Teresa Burleson at the Stockyards Museum.

At that time, Jennifer Conn, of the Arts Council of Fort Worth, was contacted about repairs. Ms. Conn picked up the heavy tail and the repairs

have already been made. The tail has been re-attached and the statue is whole again!

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


