Naturally, I vote for strong. ~ *Marty*

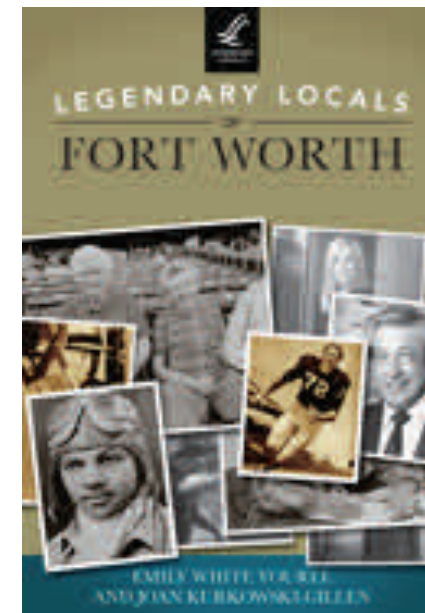
Complimentary Letter from Tarleton State University

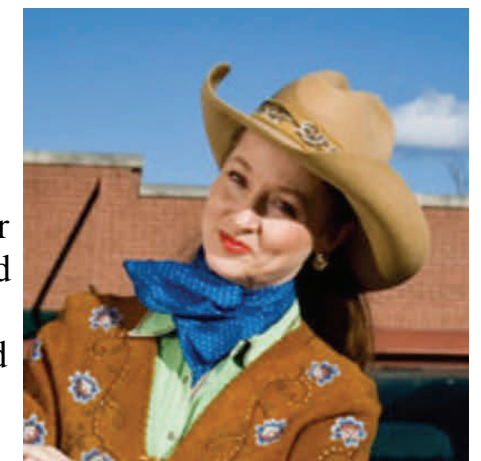
The NFWHS Members Meeting is August 14th at 7pm.

Theo's Saddle & Sirloin Inn (also known as Theo's Café)

The building that housed Theo's Saddle & Sirloin Inn, built in the 1920's, was a small saloon with a hotel upstairs. The Ward Hotel had 17 rooms and a common restroom, 1 bathroom for use for all rooms to share.

Theo Yordanoff, a native of Skopje, Yugoslavia, who ran the small saloon, cooked and served food, is remembered for introducing "Calf Fries" to the menu at Theo's Saddle & Sirloin Inn in the Stockyards. Yordanoff would get the calf testicles free of charge from the Swift and Armour packing houses and stuff them into sandwiches for .15 cents. The menu item was considered a cheap and nourishing meal for the men that worked in the packing plants and the Stockyards.

Theo married a Polish woman by the name of Josephine and she added more items to the menu such as Kapusta soup. Risky's Steakhouse is now located where Theo's was. Calf Fries and Kapusta Soup are still on the menu.

The Stockyards Museum is now a Blue Star Museum.

As a Blue Star Museum, Stockyards Museum is part of a national appreciation program for military families as a way to say "thank you." Blue Star Museums is a collaboration among the National Endowment of the Arts, Blue Star Families, the Department of Defense, and more than 2,000 museums across the United States. The program runs through Labor Day (Monday, Sept. 1, 2014).



This free admission program is available to any bearer of a Geneva Convention common access card (CAC), a DD Form 1173 ID card (dependent ID), or a DD Form 1173-1 ID card, which includes active duty U.S. military - Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, Coast Guard, as well as members of the National Guard and Reserve, U.S. Public Health Service Commissioned Corps, NOAA Commissioned Corps - and up to five family members.
