Montgomery Plaza will close by 2016 and relocate back to the Records & Archives at the Burgess location.

Washington, DC...As part of ongoing budget adjustments, Archivist of the United States David S. Ferriero announced the permanent closure of three National Archives facilities.

Anchorage, AK, will close this year (2014) and two facilities in the Philadelphia, PA, area will be consolidated to a single site. By 2016, two Archives' facilities in Fort Worth, TX, also will be consolidated to a single site. These closures and consolidations will result in estimated annual cost savings of approximately \$1.3 million. Ferriero continues, "I recognize these cuts will be painful; however, we are committed to continuing to provide the best service to our customers and best working conditions for our staff nationwide."

Fort Worth, TX, facility consolidation

The National Archives currently maintains two facilities in Fort Worth: a combined records center and archives at John Burgess Drive, and a smaller "storefront" facility at Montgomery Plaza. The National Archives will permanently close the Montgomery Plaza facility in 2016. All employees at the Montgomery Plaza location will move to John Burgess or telework locations. No original records are stored at Montgomery Plaza, and researchers will have continued access to archival records through the research room at John Burgess Drive.

SSDI Access to Change...New Law Passed

Dec 26, 2013 The Budget Bill included 2 new parts that affect our access to the Social Security Death Index (SSDI). It will exempt SSDI from the Freedom of Information Act & it will limit our access to 3 years from the date of death. Do not send money with an SS-5 request if the death is within 3 years. It will be denied. It is estimated this measure will prevent ID theft and save up to 60 billion in revenue that is lost to fraudulent tax returns. It could also raise 500 million in revenue by requiring certification fees to those who must gain access to these records.

Ed: I guess we can sacrifice access for 3 years to gain the benefit of better ID protection and less loss through fraud.


