May General Meeting with Dr. Bernard N. Meisner

The Civil War was one of the darkest times in our nation's history, but it was the beginning of modern warfare on a huge scale. It also generated a huge amount of records. Most likely we all have either a Yank or a Reb or both in our ancestry.

Dr. Bernard Meisner spoke to FWGS at the May Meeting on **"Mining the Gems in Civil War Pension Files."** He provided many examples of the plethora of kinds of information one can find on Union and Confederate soldiers and sailors. He also showed us the differences in records created and the dates and places you might look for those records.

Did you know even if your civil war pensioner died in the late 1800's, his widow might have lived into the 1920's. Some who married multiple times may have had a widow or dependant into the 1950's. Those records after 1929 might be with the Veterans Affairs Department.

Are You Making These 3 Mistakes?

Editor: This was spotted in Michael J. Lecleric's *Genealogy News* blog on Mocavo, in an article on 31 May 2014 entitled: "Three Pivotal Mistakes Genealogists Make"

1. **Believing Without Seeing.** Old, but good advice is to "Trust, But Verify."
2. **Speed Reading and Assuming.** Read carefully, scrutinize, and analyze. Is it possible? Do dates add up?
3. **Trying to do it ALL online.** Is it a transcription? The more hands and typists the info passes through, the more room for errors. Again verify by seeing the actual documents if possible.
