Mary Louise Garcia, our Tarrant County Clerk spoke in July. She convinced us her office is the busiest in the county. Her office serves 1.9 million citizens and works with 41 cities (the only county in the state to work with that many city entities.) Her office oversees 6 divisions ranging from courts, county commissioners, taxes, land, to our favorites, vital records (birth, death, probate, & marriage.) Many of these are searchable on-line now. She told us about MegaSearch where deed records can be found (1958-2015). Searches are free, but if you need a copy, you can pay online for the same price you would have paid downtown. And you can skip the parking charges and all the walking! Her watch words are service for the public, technology and preservation of our precious records. And still comes in under budget! Other NEWS! There is a new museum in Texas: **The BRYAN MUSEUM** of Galveston! The museum, founded by Mary Jon and J.P. Bryan, is the result of their lifetime commitment to historic preservation and education.

The Bryan Museum houses the largest collection of its type in the world: 70,000 items, spanning 2,500 years, including treasures from ancient Native American cultural artifacts to 21st century pieces, rare German, French, Spanish and English documents, exquisite saddles, spurs, antique firearms, exceptionally rare maps and books, fine art, religious and folk art, portraits, and documents.

It is located in Galveston in an historic building at 1315 21st St. (10 blocks from the historic Strand and 5 blocks from the beach.) Doesn't it sound like a trip to the BRYAN with a side trip to the Beach would be perfect for AUGUST?


